Keoni Mole, a Sixth Form student from Teignmouth Community School, has been awarded a black belt in kick boxing. Keoni was awarded his belt back in December 2018. What makes this achievement extra special is that he suffers from Cystic Fibrosis. Keoni is one of around 10,400 people in the UK suffering from CF.

When Keoni was around 12 years old he was inspired by his sister, a keen and very talented footballer, and wanted to take part in a sport of his own. He wanted to live a normal life and didn't want his condition to get the better of him.

Keoni started training in mixed martial arts. With years of training, and although he has suffered many setbacks, Keoni has made his dream come true! Despite the best advice from specialists to take it easy, Keoni has dedicated himself to the sport – he trains 4 nights a week and takes part in competitions. Keoni has competed in a total of 4 competitions and won them all; 4 wins, 0 lost, 0 draws. Keoni believes he may be the only Cystic Fibrosis sufferer to currently hold a black belt in kick boxing.

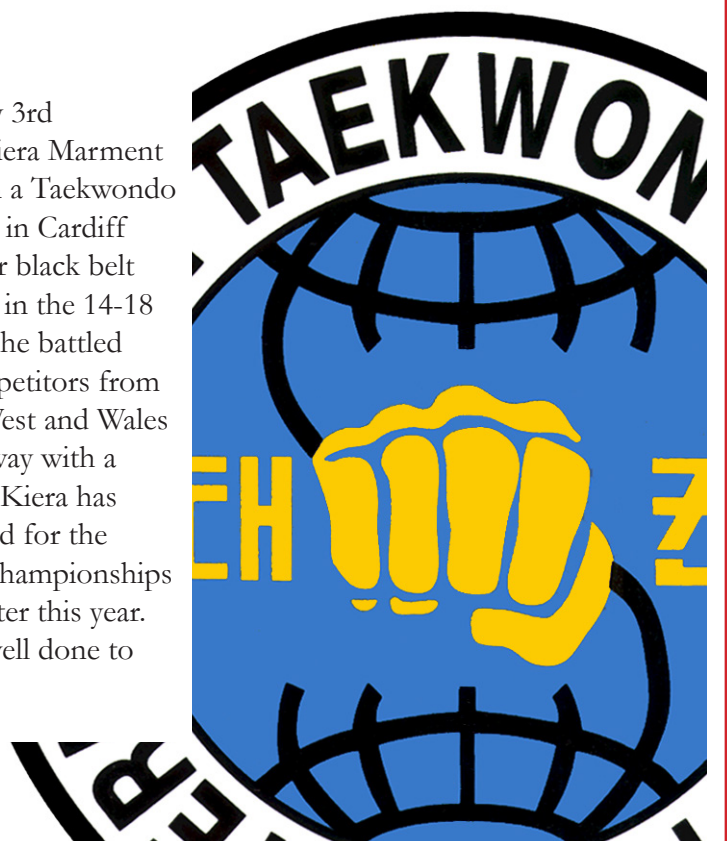
When Leah was 8 years old, inspired by a creative writing session, she came home and started to write a story for children her own age. Three years later, with the help of her father, 'The Land of Magical Surprises' was published. This happened in October 2017 when Leah was 12 years old, making her one of the youngest authors in Devon. The book can be purchased through a number of online retailers including Amazon and Waterstones. Leah has been on radio stations such as Radios Exe, The Breeze, Riviera radio and BBC Radio Devon. Last October Leah appeared on Southwest ITV after reading her book at a local primary school to other children. BBC Spotlight may be coming to film Leah at another school this year.

At the same time as Leah started to write, she became interested in acting. As a result of joining Southwest Artists of Bristol, she was selected for a main part in a Documentary film for J.P TV (the equivalent of the BBC in Japan) about the life of Agatha Christie. Leah played the young Agatha, filmed on location at Agatha Christie's summer home at Green Ways, now a National Trust property. Leah continues to be interested in acting and was in last year's panto, 'Peter Pan', at the Pavilion. She won an acting award from TYKES

Festival in the summer of 2018 for acting and voice and will be starring in this February's, TCS production of 'Bugsy Malone'. Leah is refreshingly modest about her talents but is a great example of a TCS student who throws herself into an array of disciplines with exceptional flair. She is a real credit to the school.



On Saturday 3rd February, Kiera Marment competed in a Taekwondo competition in Cardiff against other black belt competitors in the 14-18 age group. She battled against competitors from the South West and Wales and came away with a gold medal. Kiera has now qualified for the European Championships in Ireland later this year. A massive well done to Kiera!



Environmental Team

A new year, a fresh start, and, along with many New Year's resolutions, we are looking into pointing more energy and focus on recycling at our school.

At the beginning of the year our new principal, Mr James O'Connell, pinpointed some main areas to improve and develop upon here at TCS. One of these areas included our environment and recycling. We have created a strong environmental team of over 25; this is made up of students and staff. Although we already have contractors working with the school to recycle some of our waste, we are keen to increase the amount we recycle around the school.

Our aim

To create awareness amongst students and staff; work together to become a cleaner and environmentally friendly school. This can be fun and educational, we look to change perceptions through staff modelling behaviour, and peer influence. We plan to target the main areas of waste around the site, with an aim to identify recyclable items of rubbish, and work together as a community, to reduce items that can't be recycled.

Our kick start ideas

- Form teams to collect particular sorts of waste to clean and sell as an enterprise.
- Create a display/installation/sculpture out of collected rubbish.
- Build on the existing teams to collect rubbish and perhaps turn this into a competition.
- Run small and bigger projects to improve our school environment – horticultural and artistic.
- Run a series of assemblies on environmental topics – locally and/or global. These could highlight the different projects and groups running.
- Create an awareness around items that cannot be recycled with a view to greatly reduce or completely cut out.
- Generally encourage the use of recycle bins to separate rubbish for collection.

We are very excited to work with a company called Terracycle. They recycle almost anything and specialise in the "non – recyclable", whether its coffee capsules from home, pens, plastic gloves, crisp packets and much more. We plan to sign up to become a collection point. All of our separated and recycled waste will then be turned into points for the school.

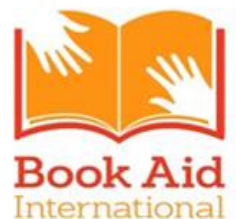


This year TCS staff and students (Exeter Road) will be celebrating Spring 2019 DEAR Day and World Book Day in style...

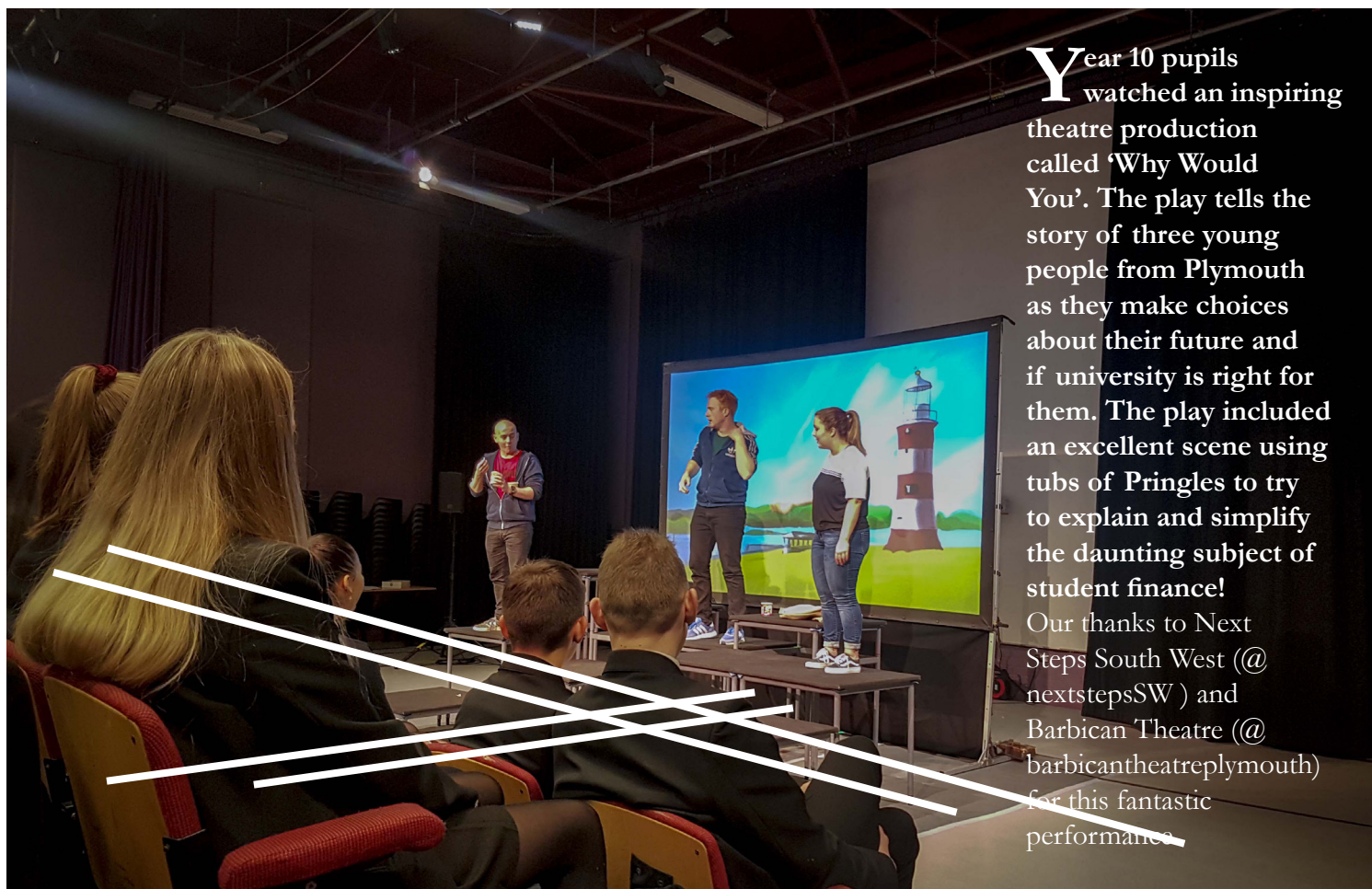
REMEMBER:-
